# We have officially moved!

storage warehouse on School Ground Road to a new location on Thompson Road. The layout is more accommodating for volunteers to work, and significantly simplifies and reduces the amount of manual labor needed.

This past fall, our old warehouse lease was up for renewal with substantial increases to our rental costs, placing our overall operations in jeopardy. Faced with this dilemma, a small team explored all options, reassessed our needs and our finances. We sharpened our

We've moved from our book pencils to manage our costs to maximize the amount of support we give to the Blackstone library. With some luck, we were able to secure a new space and restructure our storage expenses. Overall, our costs have still increased, but not as much as they would have increased had we stayed put.

> Securing the new space was only half the battle! We had to move out of our warehouse in an extremely short amount of time during December. Jane Kenealy and a small team spent tremendous time designing, negotiating, and revisiting plans to come up

with the optimal layout for our new space. It was a tight timeline, and it took truly a team effort to make this happen. With the help of volunteers and donated time and equipment from Van Wilgens, Branford Lumber, and Smedley Construction, we were able to move all of our inventory and were up and running by the start of the new year.

The move was concurrent with the construction work at the new warehouse needed to accommodate our needs and requirements. It was a tightly coordinated schedule!

The construction work was a significant one-time cost that Friends incurred. We were fortunate to have recently received an



ARPA grant to offset revenue losses incurred during COVID. Without this funding, it would have been difficult to continue to support our library at the same levels this year. As you may be aware, in addition to supporting enrichment programs, materials and activities, another of our organization's objective is to promote literacy and make books available and affordable to all in our community.

# Swords and More at JBML!

On a Sunday afternoon in In January over 60 people attended a Friends' sponsored event at the Blackstone Library. 'Swords and More' was presented by Christopher Valli and other members of Laurel City Historical Fencing, a medieval martial arts training group in Winsted, CT.

After a brief introduction to the history of medieval martial arts. Chris introduced us to some of the weapons they use such as the longsword and a buckler (a small shield). He also explained the various training weapons like the Rondel training dagger and a rubber poleaxe. This was

accompanied by demonstrations using the weapons in combat as well as explanations of how they could be used against an opponent. The rules of combat are very specific and controlled to ensure the combatants are safe and include the wearing of special padded clothing.

The final part of the program involved participation by the younger members of the audience who were asked to identify the various items of armor that would have been worn during medieval times. As each item was identified, Chris added it to his costume with an explanation as to its purpose until finally he was fully clothed in armor.



#### Jane Kenealy

Archivist Jane Kenealy likes things to be organized! Her organizational skills were apparent as one of the leaders in the recent successful move to the new warehouse location at Thompson Road. She juggled the numerous details and schedules smoothly and with obvious enjoyment. All this while continuing to sort donations in her travel book specialty – a typical JBML Friends volunteer role preparing for the book sale dates coming up in 2024. No stranger to travel, Jane hails originally from Somerset county in the UK, southwest of London. There she taught elementary school in London and managed several British pubs. In 1999 she and husband Tony made a major move to San Diego, CA. She became involved organizing the extensive collections of the San Diego History Center. In 2017 she changed jobs to work for the Japanese American Historical Society. In



2020 as COVID was upon the world, they had to change locations and so single handedly Jane had to move everything to another location. She alone packed documents, artwork and artifacts, including fragile sculptures and ceramics as well as designing a space to house the Japanese American collection. Leaving California in 2021 to be closer to their family in the UK, Jane and Tony drove cross country to settle in Branford, Connecticut – an environment they love partly because it resembles areas in their native England. Here Jane enjoys gardening, antique shopping and sharing Tony's Sci-Fi interests. (He is also a Friend's volunteer, specializing in Pop-Culture books and online book sales).

Although the "big move" to the new warehouse location is now accomplished, Jane will always be organizing – "smoothing the system", as she puts it. With so many generous community members donating books and limited space to sort and store them, flexibility is always key.




A mildly dystopian novel in which any anti-American speech results in your children being taken away forever. One woman fights the system in her own unique way and this is her story.
