From the Director

We jumped right into the holiday spirit to kick off December. The Friends hosted their Holiday Gift Basket Sale beginning on December 1, to coincide with the Town's Shop, Sip & Stroll event. Congratulations to the Friends for having a record-breaking gift basket sales event, with over \$3,500 in sales!

While the gift baskets were being sold in the lobby, the library also hosted tables of gingerbread houses for a fundraiser by the Community Dining Room (CDR).

Deidre attended a Sierra Integrated Library System (ILS) training meeting at the Scranton Library in Madison to learn how to get the most out of running reports and network with other librarians to see how they use reporting to better manage the collections.

Alondra began working with a Branford resident to create and offer a seed library. We'll partner to solicit seeds from the community in the coming months and we hope to get teens involved in making seed library boxes to hold the contents. We hope to have the seed library ready in the spring, and will see how it 'grows' over time.

Similar to a subscription service, teens fill in a short questionnaire detailing the types of books they are interested in reading. Emily then curates a personalized reading box with a couple of selections along with a snack or hands-on activity. This is the perfect way to discover new authors or a recommended read over winter break. 
OUTREACH EVENTS
