

Highlights from the Youth Services Department—August

We had a wonderful August in Youth Services! We savored the long summer days with a few special programs featuring our summer reading theme, **Find Your Voice**.

First, we celebrated the launch of local author Kimberly Behre Kenna's middle-grade novel, Jett Jamison and the Secret Storm. Kenna's novel centers around a girl who gains the confidence to speak out when an important book at her local library is censored. The library in the book is modeled after the Blackstone, and Kenna shared how her own family's connection to the Blackstone Library inspired parts of the story.

After talking about Jett's journey to finding her voice, Kenna taught participants about how storytellers around the world use beads to tell their stories, with each bead on a strand representing a particular part of the tale. Participants then got the chance to create story beads of their own, and afterwards enjoyed cookies and a book signing with the author.

Conservation Center also visited this month for a program on animal voices. Wildlife educators came to the library to share all about the animals that call Connecticut home and the various sounds they make. During their program, The Sound of (Nature's) Music, participants learned how to identify animals by listening to their noises and calls. The educators even brought in an owl named Shakespeare to

novel. She prepared interactive activities for the participants, including making their own story beads.

The final event in our summer reading series was a concert with children's performer Michele Urban of My Music Room. Michele kept everyone engaged with her interactive songs about dinosaurs, the ocean, friendship, and more! She also incorporated our summer reading theme by inviting children to come up to the microphone and share their voice. This was a lively event for the whole family with lots of movement and audience participation.

We are so grateful to the Allan Louis Loeb Foundation, the Branford Community Foundation, and the Friends of the James Blackstone Memorial Library for making all of these special summer reading events possible!

Our Take N Make kits remain very popular with families, and this month we were inspired by nature. Each kit had the supplies to make a caterpillar resting on a leaf using pompoms, googly eyes, and green paper. Thanks to our Junior Teen Advisory group for preparing these kits for us!

Teens also enjoyed our monthly Dungeons and Dragons campaign and a 3D printing workshop this month.

I was able to participate in some in-person professional development in August, attending a Library Furniture Expo hosted by the Connecticut Library Consortium at the Wallingford Public Library. At this event, I learned about how the Stratford Library redesigned their children's space, and got ideas for ways to make our space more user-friendly and welcoming. It was great to connect with some other Youth Services librarians in person, and I look forward to implementing some of the things I learned in the future!

Highlights from the Reference Department—August

We had some well-attended programs in August including Friday game night, another Trivia program at Caius Brewery, a cello concert attended by 81 people and our Lawn-a-Palooza event with 125 people stopping by over the course of the event. A great time was had by all!

Jenna completed our new eight page fall events calendar and it looks great. Thanks to the Friends of the Blackstone Library for sponsoring this expanded calendar. The Programming Committee has some terrific programs lined up for the fall.

We are very excited to see our Library of Things collection grow. This project has been a lengthy one and Jordan has worked hard

to choose Things that we feel our patrons will be excited to check out. Many thanks to Christina as well, for cataloging these unusual items, and to Emily and her staff for making space to store them in the Crafts room. In addition to our lawn games, we now have eight sewing machines, a birdwatching kit, a travel kit, a basic tool set, a cordless drill, a metal detector, a Nintendo Switch, gardening tools, memory kits, a VCR/DVD player, a telescope, a Kill-a-watt meter, a GoPro kit, and two Apple pencils. We will be adding to the collection in the near future. Patrons can also check out a laptop or iPad for use in the building or on the grounds.

Debby, Jordan and Christina all attended a Zoom webinar on Al.

Jordan and Christina are offering a class on AI in September and plan to use a number of the ideas that they learned about at the webinar. Jordan found the most useful applications to be book recommendations, creating book displays, and summarizing articles. Some new uses that he learned about included mapping out travel plans, brainstorming kit ideas (a potential Library of Things use), transcribing Zoom meetings, rephrasing sentences, developing policies, and drafting legal documents. While there are challenges and pitfalls to using AI, there are also some very useful applications for us as
