

Report to the Board of Trustees

September 7, 2022

From the Director

This has been a very busy summer. Library usage (borrowing, meeting rooms, program attendance, etc) is steadily growing. I've continued to meet with staff, board members, Friends members, and others to learn more about the Blackstone from a Director's point of view.

I attended Town Merchant meetings, representing the library, sharing what we're up to and learning about various events happening in Branford. I also attended a LION Board meeting, held at the Otis Library in Norwich.

The Strategic Plan team created a draft of the Strategic Framework, the culmination of 18+ months of hard work, which was circulated to the Board of Trustees for review and comment prior to the September board meeting.

We ordered and received new powered side tables for the new chairs in the main floor rotunda. These tables were funded by a special gift from the Friends of the Blackstone Library. Each table has 2 electric outlets and 1 USB port, allowing users to plug in and recharge their devices.

Thanks to another gift from the Friends, we were able to begin loaning a collection of lawn games! They debuted at

the 125th Birthday Bash. Since then, the lawn games, including cornhole, croquet, horseshoes, Spikeball, and more, have been in near constant circulation. To make sure even more people have a chance to borrow a game, we've changed the lending period for lawn games (and the rest of our Library of Things) from 3 to 2 weeks.

On July 22, Jenna Anthony gave a tour of the library to a group of part-time staff from the Guilford Free Library, as part of their professional development day. They were excited to see the changes since the renovation.

On August 5, staff, joined by trustee Adam Spilka, participated in an in-service training session to learn about the basics of intellectual freedom.

Beginning August 15 and running through November 1, the library is participating in an art installation/geocache project with local artist Jen Payne. This is a statewide artist treasure hunt, and people must solve clues to find the treasure. Learn more at somethingprojects.net. Highlights from the Youth Services Department—June & July

BIRTHDAY BASH

In June, we celebrated 125 years of serving our community. Thanks to the a sponsorship from the Friends of the Library, the Youth Services Department was able to book master storyteller Bill Harley, who uses a combination of storytelling and singing to entertain the entire family. It was fun to see our library lawn filled with so many smiling faces.

After that, Miss Sarah took over, manning our brandnew lawn game collection, also provided by the Friends of the Library. Sarah pooled together a group of volunteers, teens and adults, to man the games and show families how to play them. The volunteers spent most of the day chatting with families and showcasing this collection.

During the Bash, Miss Mary was busy inside the building, talking to families about summer reading, checking out books, and making brand new cards. People also got to participate in an ocean-themed scavenger hunt that Miss Carol had completed the day before.

MIDDLE SCHOOL OUTREACH

Mid-month Miss Sarah and I were able to ZOOM in with a couple of middle school groups before the school year ended. During these sessions we were able to highlight our resources and the programs we have to offer. It was nice engaging with the students and shar-



ing how they can get involved with the library.

NEW FISH TANK

Our fish tank made possible by the Friends of the Library also debuted this summer. Miss Sarah did an amazing job curating the overall look of the tank as well as researching which fish to get. Children of all ages have enjoyed watching them swim and many have pulled up a book to read aloud to them.

SUMMER READING PROGRAMS & FUN

Teen volunteers helped decorate the department for summer reading with ocean-themed photobooth opportunities and light-up paper jellyfish to get ready for summer reading.

In July, our drop-in touch tank provided by the Mystic Aquarium was a huge success, with well over 70 people stopping by the tables set up in the lobby. The touch tank provided handson crustacean experiences as well as two specialists to answer questions.

We also hosted back-to-back paint nights for kids and teens with Pam's Picassos that were well-attended. Being able to provide this program after hours meant that working parents could attend, which brought in some new faces and supports our goal that library programming should be accessible to all.

We offered our first creative writing sessions with Amy Bowers for children. Amy mixes writing, movement activities, and discussion to draw in all types of learners. Each participant left with the beginnings of a short story that they will hopefully submit to our end of summer creative writing contest!

We also partnered with Branford Parks & Recreation, inviting their youngest campers to take part in a library field trip. The small group of preschoolers enjoyed a storytime, with songs and a craft. Every camper that attended left with our summer programming catalog so hopefully we will see them throughout the rest of the summer.

NEW APP FOR eBOOKS & AUDIOBOOKS



The library launched the

Palace Project app this month. The Palace Project is a new, non-profit platform for public library users to access e-book and e-audiobook collections in one place. Included in the Palace app are the LION consortium OverDrive collection, the State of Connecticut's collection and the Digital Public Library of America collection of over 10,000 titles. Available on the App Store or Google Play, library patrons simply choose their library, add their library barcode and they are ready to borrow. Titles placed on hold or downloaded from the Over-Drive collection can still be accessed in the Libby app if patrons prefer to continue using Libby.

ADULT SUMMER READING

Adult Summer Reading launched on June 25th. No registration is necessary. Patrons can pick up a game sheet at the library and participate as much or as little as they like. There are nine challenges to complete – one for each week. They can be

completed all at once or spaced out. The more challenges completed, the more tickets collected, the more chances there are to win.

Once a challenge is completed, name and contact info should be filled out and the ticket placed in the box that corresponds to the prize of choice. Each challenge is good for one prize entry, and the prize entry boxes are located in the ground floor lobby of the library. Gift certificates from local businesses include: R.J. Julia's, Common Grounds, Ashley's Ice Cream, Lenny's, and Thimble Island Brewery.

REFERENCE STAFFING

The Reference Department has been undergoing some changes in personnel and responsibilities. Christina has taken over most of the cataloging duties for the entire library, in addition to continuing with tech appointments, tech classes, Community Webs, Strategic Planning, and shifts at the Reference desk. She had twenty individual tech appointments in July, taught a Google Docs class and had tech drop-in days at the library and at the Senior

Center. Other reference librarians pitch in to help with some of the tech appointments, but Christina handles the vast majority and she has been a favorite for some time for our patrons seeking tech help!

We also prepared to say goodbye to Brendan Galvin who has accepted a full-time position at the Yale Music Library. We are delighted for him and very sad to see him go. Debby is accepting resumes to fill one full-time and two part-time positions in the Reference Department.

PROGRAMS

Jenna is finalizing the Fall programs and we are all excited to see more and more patrons attend in-person programs at the library. In July, in addition to Latin classes, poetry, book groups, Saturday cinema, coloring and knitting groups, we had a lecture by Jane Bouley on the Architecture of the Blackstone Library, an art opening by Yvonne Gordon-Moser, a very well-received jazz concert, and a program on scrapbooking with plants in the 18th century.


