DR. WALSH

Dr. James J. Walsh is a native of Pennsylvania. He is a graduate of Fordham College. He received his degree of M.D. from the University of Pennsylvania. He also studied at the Universities of Paris, Vienna and Berlin. He has received the honorary degrees of LL. D. from Fordham, Litt. D. from Georgetown, and Sc. D. from Notre Dame. He has practiced medicine in New York City since 1898, and has found time for many other activities, educational, literary and professional. He has been lecturing for many years.

The library has the following books by him:

Health Through Will Power; Success in a New Era; and The Thirteenth, Greatest of Centuries. He has also written: Catholic Churchmen in Science;

The Century of Columbus; Education, How Old the New; History of Medicine in New York; Makers of Modern Medicine; Medieval Medicine; Modern Progress and History; Old Time Makers of Medicine; The Popes and Science; Psychotherapy; and Religion and Health. He is co-author of Essays in Pastoral Medicine and Makers of Electricity.

The attendance at the concert for young people by Miss Rose Bryant was 110, and at her evening concert, 230. Her accompanist was Miss Frances P. Parker of New Britain. Mr. Rechlin was unable to come on account of the death of his father. Miss Bryant writes: "I have never sung to such a well behaved audience of school children and I have sung many such concerts. I hope the Branford people were as glad to have me, as I was to be there."
