

CLASS HISTORY

As a ship puts out to sea, we, the class of nineteen thirty-five, embark on our responsibilities which this graduation enables us to undertake.

Classmates---let us go back and recall the time when first we came to Branford High School to attain that knowledge which was offered us by the faculty. The inevitable process of being tormented by a group called Sophomores soon wore off as we gained recognition among the upper classmen and took part in their activities. Our merit became so noticeable that we were soon authorized to elect officers. John Vailette was elected president; Dorothy Carr, vice-president; Paul Tierney, secretary; and Minerva Robinson, treasurer. Our first social function was in the form of the Freshman Dance. It was given in October in the High School Gym which was attractively dressed in Hallowe'en decorations.

Time passed quickly and the next September saw us coming back as full-fledged Sophomores which gave us the privilege of tormenting the petulant Freshmen. The following officers were elected for the year: John Vailette, president; Frank Carlson, vice-president; Alice Kingston, secretary; and Whitby Maddern, treasurer. Our Sophomore Hop, largely attended and a great success, was held in the school gym.

The following year we re-entered school as Juniors. Whitby Maddern was elected president; Dorothy Wilkins, vice-president; and Conrad Matson, secretary-treasurer. We soon saw the necessity of selecting a class ring, and a committee was appointed. The standard ring was decided upon, and in due time we received the first insignia of our Alma Mater. When spring rolled around we began to anticipate the greatest social event of our school career, the Junior Prom. The appointed committee, together with the enthusiastic student body, made this a most successful affair.

The Senior Board of "The Voice of the School" at this time gave us the opportunity of taking over the edition of the paper. Their successors were as follows: Felix Dzwonkoski, Charlotte Howd, Thomas Ward, Josephine Carullo, Irene Schoening, Whitby Maddern, Dorothy Wilkins, Mavis Falk, Lucille Sawyer, Minerva Robinson, Rosalind Bowden, Mary Yusievicz, Cecilia Dower, Enis Paul and Dorothy Spevack. The name of the paper was changed to "The Beacon" and with the aid of Miss Murphy many successful issues were published.

At the graduation exercises of the class of nineteen thirty-four Felix Dzwonkoski had the honor of being presented with the Harvard Book Prize, an award given to the boy who has shown the greatest scholastic ability and accomplishment in his first three years of high school.

The next September the same group returned, true to form, dignified Seniors. The election of officers took place as in previous years. They were: Whitby Maddern, president; Dorothy Wilkins, vice-president; Conrad Matson, secretary-treasurer. At this time two new clubs were formed, namely the Dramatic Club and the French Club. Under the guidance of Miss Murphy and Miss Marland these organizations were made into interesting and worthwhile activities. The class book committee was elected with Enis Paul as editor-in-chief, and with the publication of this book we found that we had nearly reached the end of our high school career. Our social life was brought to a close with the Senior Dance.

And now as we board the Ship of Life, the cries of "Bon Voyage" will help to guide us o'er the shoals, and we will never forget the days we spent in Branford High.
