

NAVAL BATTALION CHANGES. Commander Averill Resigns After Meritorious Service.

Last Friday, the Hon. Frederick L. Averill sent his resignation as commander of the Connecticut Naval Battalion to Adjutant-General G. M. Cole, at Hartford, which has been accepted and Mr. Averill has been placed on the retired list.

Commander Averill enlisted in the Naval Battalion in June, 1894, served as seaman and non-commissioned officer until November, 1899, when he was elected commander, which position he has filled with complete satisfaction to the state and the officers and men under him. Under his command the Battalion has attained a high degree of efficiency, and Mr. Averill leaves the service with the knowledge that his resignation is regretted by each and every officer and enlisted man in the three divisions. During the Spanish war he served as assistant paymaster, rank of ensign in the United States Navy enlisting in July, and receiving his discharge on September 2, 1808 tember 3, 1898.
