

Class History

Valedictory

"Two roads diverged in a yellow wood, And sorry I could not travel both And be one traveler, long I stood And looked down one as far as I could To where it bent in the undergrowth;

And both that morning equally lay
In leaves no step had trodden black.
Oh, I marked the first for another day!
Yet, knowing how way leads on to way,
I doubted if I should ever come back."

These few lines were written by Robert Frost in his own distinctively simple and sincere way. Tonight we, this graduating class of 1939, stand in the yellow wood at the parting of the ways. Before we proceed, it is fitting to review briefly our past four years.

We are, of course, proud to be the class which has seen the founding of several new traditions in our school. For example, there was the Honor Roll Supper, which was attended by the parents of those students who were members of the Honor Roll, of the Student Council, or of the Service Squad. Three hundred and fifty persons, by their presence, endorsed what promises to be an annual custom.

For that matter, the Service Squad was started during our stay in the high school, and the Student Council was revived.

Our Junior year saw the holding of the first class social; our Senior year, the presentation of a Senior Class Play, and the planting of trees on Arbor Day. Furthermore, it was the senior members of the Library Club who first took over the management of our new library, and it was our class, this class of 1939, which watched the Junior High School pupils take up their quarters in the new addition to our school building.

Classmates, those who are about to set forth on a journey ordinarily take with them those necessities which will make that journey a success. If I were asked which attribute of character would prove most valuable for our journey through life, I would recommend "courage". Courage is that quality of spirit which, when we know what is right, gives us the ability to do it. In the world of today, a world of unrest, of insecurity, of alarms, the quality of courage is indispensable. If people only had the courage to stand up for what they know is right, so much of the sadness, suffering, and sacrificing of innocent victims could be prevented!

And where would we be if there had been no courage in the past? No William Henley, who wrote on a bed of pain, his famous lines:

"I am the master of my fate: I am the captain of my soul!"

No Clara Barton, who faced the horrors of war to aid sick and wounded soldiers—No Christopher Columbus who faced physical dangers and unknown terrors—yes, and even personal disgrace—to prove his theory that the world was round—No Father Damien who entombed himself on the leper island of Molokai to bring comfort to an afflicted people—

And there have been countless others whose names are not known to history, but whose valiant lives equally merit recognition.

I can do no better than leave with you this poem by Grace Noll Crowell:

What shall I take into the coming year? And what shall I leave behind? I asked my heart, And quick came the answer: "Lay all doubt and fear And anxious care aside before you start. Take life's stark necessities along: The Word of God, and daily study it, The staff of faith, the lamp of hope, a song Of high and dauntless courage; fill your kit With laughter, and take happiness to wear, 'Twill cloak you on the bleakest, coldest day; And take an apple and a loaf to share With one who may be hungry on the way. Fill your canteen from a wayside well, You may grow thirsty," said my cautious heart, "And Hark! across the world a midnight bell Peals out a summons—it is time to start!"
