Project Background

The Blackstone Memorial Library is an architectural icon of the Branford community, yet it is still a building designed in the 19th Century for a library that must now adapt to meet the needs of 21st Century patrons.

	Challenges of the Building	Solutions to Challenges
Children's and Teen Areas	Children's room location on the top floor is difficult to access for parents with young children and the space is inadequate.	The entire children's section will be moved to the ground floor for easy access with expanded space for children and a dedicated family bathroom.
	For teens, there is no program area specifically designed for young adult use including internet access and group study.	A specially designed area for teens will include 6 new computers for internet access. Adult fiction will remain on the ground floor; nonfiction and library staff offices will be moved to the upper floors.
Internet Access	Much greater internet access is needed throughout the library which currently offers only 21 public access computers.	The top floor will incorporate a computer lab with 25 computers for internet access. In combination with 8 children's computers and the 6 new computers in the Teen area, there will be a total of 39 computers for public internet access.
Meeting Rooms	There is a constant need for public meeting space which cannot be accommodated in the only two spaces available—the auditorium and Lucy Hammer Room.	To accommodate the demand for public meeting spaces of various sizes, two new meeting spaces will be provided on the top floor — a new medium -sized meeting room and a larger meeting room made possible by enclosing the auditorium balcony. In addition, the kitchen and storage areas at the back of the auditorium will be relocated to the top floor to permit the auditorium to accommodate larger programs.
Main Entrance Access	The rear entrance from the parking lot is the main access point to the building, yet it is awkwardly designed and difficult for many to use, especially parents with children for whom this is the only possible entryway.	To provide for improved entry to the library from the parking area, the current exterior walkway will be enclosed to provide a modest lobby with accessible restrooms and a more efficient circulation area. The roof of this entryway can serve as a terrace off the auditorium.
