From the Director

The library's FY 2015-2016 budget request was approved by the RTM with no changes.

We were fortunate to have an intern from Branford High School with us for most of the month. He was a great help printing backlogged items from the 3-D printer, working with Katy on development and marketing projects, and being a general help in all departments. The internship program administered through Branford High School fosters important connections in the community, and this was the second year that our student was favorably impressed by the many different resources we offer! We got a call at the beginning of the month from the producers of *The Dead Files*, a TV show that pairs a retired police detective with a medium to conduct paranormal investigations. The show is in its eighth season and airs on The Travel Channel. Scenes for an episode featuring a haunted house in North Haven were filmed at the library this month—the crew used our reading room for an interview segment, and shot b-roll in the reference room. The episode is expected to air in December.

Our first ever Murder at the Blackstone earned \$4,500 for library services and programs.

Thank you to all who attended, and volunteered for the event—it was a blast, and photos are available on our website.

The Great Give on May 5 & 6 was also a success, earning \$2,637 for the library.

Finally, we continue to receive donations to the spring appeal. To date we have earned \$10,588.

Friends of the Library and I worked together to organize the Annual John Loeb Lecture, scheduled for June 30, featuring a talk by Matt Bartlett about Female Civil War Spies.

The Friends have won their third award in as many years from the Friends of CT Libraries. This year's award is for the overall group, and will be presented on June 13 at the FOCL annual meeting.

This Month in the Youth Services Department - April

Every year we do our best to provide a variety of spring break programs for different age groups, so I thought it would be nice to highlight a few.

Our most popular program was Jon Cap's Magic and Balloon Animal Show. Jon Cap is a Branford resident who teaches high school robotics and moonlights as a magician! Jon's performances are hands-on and informative. At the end of every show participants are given the opportunity to practice various magic tricks with simple household supplies, which makes it easy for parents to continue the magic at home. The hardest part about magic is the illusion you create and Jon shows budding magicians how to misdirect and command attention! This time Jon provided step-by-step instructions for creating balloon animals. With 75+ participants, things could get a little chaotic, but Jon held everyone's attention and it was great seeing caregivers take the lead and make balloon animals for their kids.

We reached out to the Regional Water Authority (RWA) for a series of environmental programs since Earth Day was right around the corner. The RWA puts together different environmental curriculums along with all the necessary supplies, teacher sheets and drop-off/pickup for FREE. Our most popular RWA program was the Oozing Obleck. Chris-

tina and I started out by reading the Dr. Seuss classic *Bartholomew and the Oobleck*. The book tells the story of a power hungry king that wants to control everything—including the weather! Of course, things don't go as planned and the King has to rethink his ruling ways. After we read and talked a little about the story's theme we created some oobleck of our own and participants had to use their observing and predicting skills to see whether or not mixing two liquids would cause a chemical reaction or change. This was a great way to introduce the differences between liquids and solids and it was nice to go through the scientific process as a group.

We also hosted a successful week long MakerLab program that focused on robots. Lessons focused on the creation of BrushBots, which use toothbrushes and small batteries to create friction and thus movement as well as an ArtBot that uses a pool noodle, electric tooth brush and markers to create friction so that the uncapped markers move and create swirls across plain white pages. Participants also used the online Hour of Code website to practice operating a computer generated robot. Participants learned that coding needs to be specific in order to create action. Participants wrote code for one another so that they could complete tasks around the room. We even

used the 3D printer to generate "swag" for our ArtBots and participants closed the program by designing their own robot with our 3D printing software.

The Youth Services and Reference Department also worked with the Branford Public Schools and East Shore Region Adult Continuing Education program to provide an English Language Learners Open House. During the event those who were learning English as a second language were invited to get a library card, take tours and see a demo of our MakerBot. Debby was also able to introduce our new subscription to Mango Languages.

Miss Mary and I were also able to attend this year's CLA Conference. We enjoyed a lot of the speakers and got hold of some hands-on science and technology programs that we will use in the future. But, our favorite was a workshop that focused on ways to enhance storytime through music. The speakers were amazing and they gave us a lot of new songs and rhymes that we can use in our storytimes. The workshop was truly inspirational and it got us both excited to try something new!

The conference features publishers, booksellers, authors & illustrators, and gives attendees the chance to see thousands of new books that are coming out in the Fall & Spring of 2016.

Whitney and Katy toured the exhibit hall, where they picked up free copies of advance reader copies of fiction and nonfiction books that will be published in coming

months. These advanced reader copies can be used as summer reading prize giveaways. Whitney and Katy also attended a "Book Buzz" program, where upcoming titles are reviewed (good information for the Blackstone's upcoming program). They brought back materials and catalogs about upcoming titles to purchase, which they will share with the rest of the Book Selection Committee.

They also attended a talk with actress Julianne Moore and Harvard Professor Amy Cuddy, whose TED talk on power postures has led to her

forthcoming book, "Presence: Bringing Your Boldest Self to Your Biggest Challenges." Katy also had the opportunity to speak with exhibitors about attending next year's annual CLA Conference.

Attending BEA is a great way for librarians to gain awareness of trends in publishing, and learn about forthcoming titles, and to speak with industry professionals.
