From the Director

The LION best practices task force continues to work on standardizing lending practices. A draft recommendation was sent to member libraries requesting feedback by March 4.

LION has also approved funding a shared objects collection. Materials in this collection include Keva Planks, jewelry making kits, etc. Items will circulate for up to two months at a time. LION hopes to have this collection ready by summer.

In April, Blackstone Library will join 123 other Connecticut libraries for the CLA's Passport to Connecticut Libraries Program. The program encourages residents to explore the amazing diversity of our public libraries. Participants who visit at least five participating libraries and return their stamped passport to a participating library by May 6 will be entered into one state-wide drawing for a chance to win a \$150 Visa gift card for adults (18 and up) and a \$100 Visa gift card for children (under 18). This is a state-wide contest where four winners will be selected: one adult and one child from a random drawing from all who visit at least five libraries, and one adult and one child from a

At the end of January, Andy McKirdy, Robin Sandler and I attended the Board of Finance meeting to request funding to continue with the schematic phase of the library's renovation design. The request was tabled until the February 29 meeting. In the meantime, we met with Jamie Cosgrove, Jim Finch and Janice Plaziak to discuss how the project would be handled, if funding is approved.

On February 8, the New Haven Register ran a very positive article about the library's proposed renovation.

On February 12, Andy McKirdy, Kathy Oxsalida and I went to the offices of Robinson and Cole in Hartford, to meet with a repre-

sentative from Pro Bono Partners. Pro Bono provides legal services to nonprofit organizations, and they accepted our application to become a client. The first project they will work on is updating our personnel manual.

The library was closed the morning of February 26 for our annual in-service training day. Staff from all departments made presentations to share what they had learned throughout the year from various workshops. There were sessions on building safety, expert searching of our catalog, superior customer service skills, reader's advisory tips, and our Maker-Lab. Staff did a fantastic job, and they learned valuable skills from each other.

January Highlights from the Youth Services Department

This month we worked with the Connecticut Experiential Learning Center (CELC), to prepare them for their end of the year projects. Every year the CELC uses the James Blackstone Memorial Library as their research “base” and a location for displaying their final projects. Each year, students present their concept, supported by visual aids and a verbal explanation. This year, students will transform into influential people!

During CELC’s research visit, we introduced students to our online resources, helping them search for books and find reliable electronic sources through the State’s research database, formerly ReQuest and iCONN.org, rebranded as researchITCT. The site is extremely kid friendly allowing students to narrow down their searches by grade level and providing scanned articles which make it possible for readers to see magazine spreads and colored photos. There is even a citation device that helps students populate their bibliography automatically; making it easy for them to keep track of all of their research.

Once students completed their research assignments they were treated to a two-hour MakerLab workshop, with instruction on our newest 3-D printer. Students created TinkerCad accounts, learning the software and eventually creating their own prints. This MakerLab workshop was particularly special

because CELC invited their pen pals from New Jersey (another hands-on private school) to join in the 3-D design fun! We had a total of 15 students and 4 teachers attend the workshop. It was fun to introduce our MakerLab to their out of state friends, and CELC documented the entire visit on their website.

This month we also piloted a brand new program entitled Read to a Dog. Back in December, a member of the Pet Partners organization approached me about encouraging reading through the use of therapy dogs. Studies have shown that children who are nervous about reading out loud are more likely to do so with a dog since they know that they will not be judged. Students who read with dogs not only show small signs of improvement but also gain confidence in their ability since it is a joyful process. Knowing that this could positively impact readers of all ages I jumped at the chance and reached out to our elementary school reading specialists and English as a second language (ESL) teachers to spread the word about the program and see if certain children could benefit from reading to a dog. The schools were excited about the prospect so we formed our first Read with a Dog program this past month.

The first program attracted 9 students who read aloud to one of three certified therapy

dogs for a total of 15 minutes. Children were encouraged to bring their own “just right” reading material but we also had a small basket of books on standby in case somebody forgot. The kids that participated had the best time petting, reading and interacting with their dogs. Each dog also had their trainer nearby so that the kids could ask questions and learn a little about their dog before settling in with their books. The parents that attended were happy with the overall experience and cannot wait to bring their kids back the following month. I think one of the most gratifying parts of the program was seeing the number of ESL students that attended. Since those students were encouraged to sign up at school, two of their classroom teachers also came to check on the event and offer language support for those that may have needed instructional clarification. Both teachers responded positively to the event and said that they would share their experiences with other teachers and classrooms in hope of expanding the number of attendees.


Two small schools, CT Experiential Learning Center (CELC)

Then, Tuesday, 12 January, the groups came together and met for the first time. They greeted one another, sat down for lunch, and then took part in a Maker Lab to explore 3D-printer technology. Students were

fascinated, as program director Katy Dillman demonstrated the process of creating a design using Tinkercad software. Each student also had a chance to work on a computer to create designs to be printed.

A great first meeting followed by a special treat of Ashley's Ice Cream! The next collaborative adventure between CELC and Flex will be a visit to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City.
